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
INTRODUCTION

Fairy tales have a great potential to be used as a valuable source in English lessons. In appropriate adaptation these stories are suitable for all ages and levels. They have universal values and plots which add familiarity to students. The scripts as well as fairy tale itself are fun and short, rich in terms of language yet less grammatically complex and syntactically speaking than many other forms of literature. There is a great opportunity to make fairy tales as complex and simplistic as possible depending on the class in which it is introduced. Fairy tales are also a great source of vocabulary, grammar structures and syntax.

The scripts of fairy tales provided in this tool are adaptive to different degrees of learners. The structures, phrases, grammar and vocabulary may vary from class to class, even within the class. The scripts are already adapted to general requirements of 3-4 grade learners; however the phrases and sentences may easily be simplified or complicated according to the language proficiency level of the students.

Additionally, scripts are divided into scenes as was presented in the program and long-term plan. It makes the education process more engaging and enables more time for discussions and communication among peers and teacher with the class. More than that scripts differ in delivering speeches, for instance some of the scripts contain rhymes. It makes the learners more engaged and not let them to get bored of the same structure of the character's words. Some scripts are given with recommended background music, yet teacher and learners can decide to change according to their preferences.

Go this way and that way.


Have you ever seen a lassie go this way and that?

An image of a working Cinderella is projected onto the screen.

Stepsister1 (preening in front of the mirror): And I want a dress.

Stepsister2: (stamping foot): And I want a nice dress.

Stepmother (throws things on the floor): Cinderella, clean this mess! You can't go to the ball, until you do this all (gives her a long list of household chores).

Stepsister1 (chuckling): No, you can't go to the ball....

Stepsister2:.... until you do this all!

The music of the folk song "Barynya" is played. Stepmother and daughters leave.

Cinderella (reading aloud): Clean the house, wash the blouse, make food ... Oh, it's not good (crying).

Music by Vladimir Dashkevich from the film "Winter Cherry" is played.

Scene 2.

An image of a fairy is projected onto the screen.

Cinderella is crying. A fairy appears.

Fairy: Why are you crying, dear, why? Please, don't cry!

Cinderella (crying): I can't go to the ball, because my dress is very old.

Fairy: I can help you. Look at me! Close your eyes. One-two-three! (waves her magic wand) Sounds that demonstrate the effect of magic.

Cinderella spins around and takes off her old apron. The dancing fairy brings Cinderella shoes and she puts them on.

Cinderella (stares at her beautiful new dress in amazement): I can't believe this dress is mine! Thank you, fairy, you are so kind.

Fairy (shakes her finger at Cinderella): But at twelve o'clock you must be here... or your dress will disappear.

Cinderella (happily): Oh, yes, it's clear. Cinderella "sits down" in the carriage. An image of a carriage heading to the palace is projected onto the screen. Bells sound.

Scene 3.

Music sounds - G. Sviridov's Waltz. The ball begins, the king, queen, prince, guests come out.

An image of a hall in the palace is projected onto the screen.

Queen (to guests): The ball is on. Let's dance and play.

King (to guests): Let's have a lot of fun today!

Solemn orchestral sounds are played. Cinderella appears in a ball gown. Everyone looks at her with admiration.

Queen (to the king): Look at that girl!

King (admiring): She's so nice and slim!

The image of the prince and Cinderella is projected onto the screen.

Prince (approaches Cinderella): Hello! Let's dance! You are my dream!

The music sounds - Chopin's Waltz N2 in B minor. The prince and Cinderella are dancing. The clock strikes 12.

Cinderella (scared): It's twelve o'clock and I must run. Bye-bye. I had a lot of fun (Runs away losing one shoe)!

Music by Georges Diran Garvarenz "Eternal Love" is played. The prince lifts his shoe, sighs, and sadly walks off the stage. All other guests of the ball also leave the stage. An image of the palace staircase and a shoe lost on it is projected onto the screen

Scene 4.

Morning. The music of Elena Golubo from the film "Three nuts for Cinderella" sounds. The image of the room is projected onto the screen. The prince appears on the scene with the guards. The stepmother and her daughters go out yawning and stretching. Cinderella is setting breakfast on the table. Dad comes out with a newspaper.

Prince (to stepmother and daughter): We know you were at the ball. Try on this shoe.

Step Sister 1 tries to put on a shoe.

Stepsister 1 (annoyed): Oh, it's very small !!!

Step Sister 2 also tries to wear it.

Stepsister 2: Oh, it's too small !!! (frowns and gets angry)

Prince (notices Cinderella): But who is that girl? Come here, please! Try on this shoe, pretty Miss!

Stepmother (shakes his head indignantly): But she didn't go to the ball !!!

Father: Give her the shoe! Her foot is small.

An image of a prince is projected onto the screen, kneeling before Cinderella. Cinderella puts on a shoe, and the fairy brings her a second.

Prince (kneels down in front of Cinderella): I'm happy that I've found you! I love you, and I'd like to marry you.

Cinderella (happily): Oh, yes, my Prince, I love you too.

The waltz of Mendelssohn sounds.

Cinderella takes off her old apron. She is wearing a beautiful dress.

The image of a happy Cinderella in a wedding dress and a prince is projected onto the screen.

Music by M. Dunaevsky "Wind of Change" is played. All the characters of the fairy tale come out to bow. The presenter introduces each participant in the performance to the audience.

Prince: Snow White. Wake up. It is me, your Prince. I love you.


Snow White: Oh, where am I? Prince! I am so glad to see you!

Wolf: (in a soft voice): open the door, my dear children! It's me, your mother! I have some sweets for you!

Seven kids: No, no you are not our mother.

5th KID: Your voice is soft, but it is not mother's!

Scene 3

Wolf: But don't you want these nice sweets!

2nd KID: We don't want any sweets from you.

Wolf: And I have some ice-cream for you!

3d KID: We don't want any ice-cream from you.

Wolf: I have a lot of toys for you!

4th KID: We don't want any toys!

Wolf: Open the door or I shall break it!

5th KID: We are not afraid of you, big bad Wolf! *The wolf goes away*.

A very big stick. He wants to break the door.

Scene 4

1st **KID**: We are not afraid of the big bad Wolf! But we must fight him, if he comes back. (to the 2nd,3d, 4th, 5th KIDS). You, and you, and you two go and get big stick.

(to the 6th and 7th KIDS). And you two, take the pans and big spoons and...(whispers something to them. They nod.)... and stand behind the armchair. *They go to the armchair in the background*.

Storyteller: Do you hear? That is the wolf again!(the wolf come up to the door).

Wolf: Do you give up? Seven kids: No, no!

Wolf: Then I will break the door!

Seven kids: We are not afraid of you big bad Wolf!

Wolf: Do you give up? One!

Seven kids: No, no!

Wolf: Do you give up? Two!

Seven kids: No, no!

Wolf: Do you give up? Three!

Seven kids: No, no!

Storyteller: Band! The wolf breaks the door!

The wolf rushes into the room. The fight begins. The 4th and the 5th Kids fall down. The 1st kid takes a trumpet and blows it. The 6th and the 7th kids jump up from behind the armchair and make an awful noise with their pans and spoons. The wolf is frightened.

Wolf: Oh, what is that? What is that? I must run, I must run, quick, quick! He runs away. The kids run up to the 4th and 5th kids, lift them up and bandage. Mother goat comes in.

Scene 5

Mother Goat: Oh, what's the matter? What does all this mean?

1st KID: Everything's all right, mother.
2nd KID: The Wolf wanted to eat us up!
3rd KID: But it is not so easy to eat us up!

4th KID: Mother I'm hurt!

5th KID: And so am!

They all come closer to their mother, she kisses them.

Mother Goat: Oh, my dear brave children! It's very good that you are not afraid of the Wolf. There are many wolves in the world, but if we fight all together, we shall win!
